


## Inclusive Circle

A unique cultural hub of social interaction arises: an adaptable three-dimensional armature for teaching and experimentation, with modular structural bays that flexibly accommodate different creative disciplines. All sides of the building engage and extend into the city through facades and terraces that activate, invite, and expose a multitude of creative uses. Transparent vistas and green terraces dissolve boundaries to invite everyone into the creative process. A series of interconnected spaces are organized around a central atrium and outdoor terraces—to encourage the exchange of ideas and creative freedom. The publicly accessible outdoor and indoor spaces support quiet respite and reflection, activation and energy, creative performances, art, and community gatherings—acting as civic connectors to promote interactions between the building, city, and community and performers, artists, and visitors.




**Gathering Space Section - Front Street Living Room** 

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Lower Lobby Level | 1:200


Ground Floor Level | 1:200






Floor Plan - Level 2 & 3 | 1:200




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



Flat Floor - Open to Lobby Pow Wow Event

The design enables and welcomes creative success by reducing physical barriers to provide innovative, changeable, and infinitely flexible spaces that can easily be tailored to the cultural and creative autonomy of each group or individual—creating important venues for artistic expression that maximizes viewership, empowers authorship, and encourages new uses previously unimagined.


To house varied stage-audience configurations and an array of potential secondary modes within a single space, the Main Stage Theatre and Acoustic Hall use a typology where surfaces modulate physically and acoustically through automated assisted performance equipment. By adapting proven technologies for new uses, the building and lobby can be altered into a wide array of configurations in a limited time with only a small crew. The flexibility will empower directors and scenic designers to select or invent the stage-audience configuration that fulfils artistic desires to facilitate and encourage experimentation.







Flat Floor - East Stage GA at 7sf PP =









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
Wide Mode - East Stage 307 Seats




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Narrow Mode - East Stage 244 Seats

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




# Sustainability

The built environment and natural landscape weave together to create a harmonious ecology and central gathering place welcoming and celebrating all. Native plantings create a tapestry across the building and site and reclaims the original landscape that was once here, blurring the lines between interior and exterior cultural practices and enhancing our relationship . with Mother Earth.

Through the integration of an abundance of natural air ventilation, daylighting, water elements, raw materials, and generous plantings, the new STLC will be in balance with the unique urban ecology of the city of Toronto—past and present. Plantings in the public realm and verdant terraces throughout the building recall the layers of trees and lush planting that descend into the Toronto ravines and meander their way toward Lake Ontario.









### Accessibility

The new STLC elevates and inspires the experience of all who visit the campus—day and night. The inclusive design welcomes and supports people with varying audible, Interior Gatherir visual, and physical abilities and deliberately Copper Vessel avoids architecture's stigmatizing effects that often target a particular audience. An array of public spaces and a high degree of porosity across floors removes cultural, financial, and physical barriers by creating an open public space that dissolves the traditional boundaries of performing arts centres. Creative spaces are visually connected to the street and public areas of the building, dispelling the myth of the arts as an elite institution. The Community Gathering Space along Front Street has large sliding doors that open the building to Community Gathering Space ...... the street, inviting the community into the Living Room to gather and share stories.





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
## Level 7 | 1:200


### Materiality

There is a strong belief throughout many Indigenous Nations that all things must return to the land, including built spaces, to reduce our impact on our 'Mother' (the earth). The STLC will honour the natural aging process of copper and wood and will ground the building within that context.


Each copper surface will map the condition of the site over time as the exterior rain oxidizes the material, allowing the external environment to paint the walls of the STLC. This visually stunning quality provides another artistic element to the ever-transforming STLC.

Wood—a material employed extensively by Indigenous people for millennia through creative, cultural, spiritual, and structural practices—will be celebrated within the new STLC through interior and exterior use. It evokes a warm and welcoming feeling, allowing all to be drawn into the new centre.

Glass is used throughout the STLC to blur the boundaries between spaces, allowing all to feel invited into the creative process. Beginning with the glass façade along Front Street and extending upwards through the building, experiences are interconnected and woven together to allow activity—and the surrounding landscape—to spill into the building on all edges.
